Whistle While we Work: Why do we do this? Umpiring.

A few years ago a former FIH international umpire umpired on a Wednesday. He only came once. Why? He was shocked at the number of players that questioned, argued or disagreed often with his decisions. He was not prepared to give up his afternoons for this bad sportsmanship.

This was a real loss. Our "Masters Hockey" is the envy of other States and is supposed to be for the enjoyment / camaraderie of our great sport.

Players surely appreciate our fortune in having talented umpires like Lionel David and Vern Gooch (both for years umpired in WA's Classic League or First Division hockey) and John Lindsay - umpired at First Division level in NSW.

Lately the number of incidents where our umpires are given a hard time has increased and on Wednesday January 22 there were far too many ... the norm rather than the exception even discourteous in the extreme.

All players would do themselves a service by reading the current Rule Book. Besides covering all the rules of play, there is a section on umpiring. Rule 2.3.c ... "It is not acceptable for players to abuse opponents, umpires or other officials verbally or through body language and attitude."

Umpires must deal firmly with abuse of this sort. It goes on to spell out appropriate warnings (cards either Green or Yellow or Red).

Neil Scaddan suggests that umpires need to crack down much more on bad tackles - on both Wednesday and Saturday. Ian Hill is concerned that a few umpires are being a little overbearing and pedantic.

Rules 'R' Us:

In November 2013 F.I.H. introduced a couple of significant changes to the rules. I conveyed them to all our "Wednesday Masters" in John's Masters Matters.

- 1: The Own Goal experimental Rule was to be "no longer mandatory" and will become Experimental Rule only to be finally expunged from the Rules totally from 1st September 2014.
- 2: And also to be deleted / expunged from the same date, the Rule 9.7 that allows defenders to use the stick to stop or deflect the ball at any height if it is likely to enter the goal.

I had suggested that Wednesday Masters adopt both changes from January 1st 2014 for safety reasons especially. There had been numerous incidents of firing the ball into the circle willy nillly and obvious danger to the guys in the often crowded circles. Ditto with defenders swatting at the ball anywhere in the circle.

Why January 1st? Should set the highest example at all time and after a Christmas break a clean start seemed optimal. The Team Captains surely support this in the interests of safety.
