

Rules 'R' Us: The obstruction rule still applies, and now states:

<u>Rule 9.12:</u> Players must not obstruct an opponent who is attempting to play the ball. Players obstruct if they: Back into an opponent.

Physically interfere with the stick or body of an opponent.

Shield the ball from a legitimate tackle with their stick or any part of their body.

A stationary player receiving the ball is permitted to face in any direction.

A player with the ball is permitted to move off in any direction except bodily into an opponent or into a position between the ball and an opponent who is within playing distance of the ball and attempting to play it.

A player who runs in front of or blocks an opponent to stop them legitimately playing or attempting to play the ball is obstructing (this is third party or shadow obstruction). This also applies if an attacker runs across or blocks defenders (including the goalkeeper or player with goalkeeping privileges) when a corner is being taken.

Rule 9.13: Players must not tackle unless in a position to play the ball without body contact.

That should be quite clear. Also relevant here are these rules:

<u>Rule 9.2:</u> Players on the field must hold their stick and not use it in a dangerous way. (Players must not lift their stick over the heads of other players)

Rule 9.3: Players must not touch, handle or interfere with other players or their sticks or clothing.

Rule 9.4: Players must not intimidate or impede another player.

<u>Rule 9.5:</u> Players must not play the ball with the back of the stick.

In my opinion, the above makes it clear that our game is not a version of Aussie Rules with hockey sticks, but a non-contact sport. While these rules are more honoured in the breach rather than in the observance we will continue to make life more difficult for the umpires - and ourselves. Ed.

<u>Comebacks:</u> When one of our number returns from a long-term injury there is usually a very strong feel good effect. When Derek made it back on April 30th with plenty of family and all the terrific people who helped after the heart attack also in attendance this feeling was intense. Even the St John's Ambulance officers who attended on the day managed to get to the Stadium (again).

After doing the rounds (apparently a lot of us remarked on how well Derek looked) there were commitments for television down on Turf 2 and in the barbecue area. St John's are using this in their current campaign for more first-aid training (See Page 2 for WHM involvement), but I am not sure when Channel 7 are to show the footage. This was followed by a presentation ceremony in the Stadium bar, during which we were addressed by WHM Chairman Simon Thomson, Blue team captain Ash Challoner, Derek himself, St John's manager first responder community program Sally Simmonds, and Derek's son Kristan. Of course it was emotional at times, but everybody in the bar was quiet right through the ceremony - something which is impossible to achieve at other times.

Certificates from both WHM and St John's were presented to all Derek's rescuers. It was noted that between them they had managed to free Derek from his car, start CPR, call triple 000 for an ambulance, obtain the stadium defibrillator and apply it. They received the thanks of Derek, his family, and all of us at WHM in an event which struck the right note in every respect.

We hope to see Derek at the Stadium on a regular basis. How about it mate?

<u>The Origin Of WHM:</u> In this case 'PG' does not denote 'Parental Guidance'. It does represent the initials of the initiators of the very first game in 1991, according to our source. A discussion between Peter Gason and Peter Gardner is said to have led to the formation of two sides, and the start of what we have today. Bob Bowyer created this document in 2012 and it's well worth reprinting.

"The following article written by Stadium Manager at the time Grattan Wilson, appeared in the Saturday 29th May 1993 edition of the Hockey Bulletin.

"There is a dedicated band of 25 vintage hockey players enjoying a friendly Wednesday afternoon hockey match at the stadium. They have been enjoying the pleasure of each other's company on a Wednesday afternoon since October 1991. Almost without exception the games are played on the main turf and are followed by much discussion about the recently completed game and hockey in general in the stadium bar. The games start at 2:30 pm and if you are interested in joining this merry band of fit men give me a call."

Bob's update August 2004: "Not a lot has changed in regard to enjoyment in the intervening 12 years since that article was written. We now have more than twice as many players turn up regularly and we now have O/60s games from 2:00 pm to 3:30 pm when the O/50s start now."

Also of historical interest is the history of sponsorship which has been very important to the quality and validity of our club. Originally uniforms were subsidised by firms in the finance industry organised by Peter Hammond. At one stage the different coloured uniforms were sponsored by County Natwest, Potter Warburg, Barclays Bank and Macquarie Bank. These were followed for about 3 years by Jardine Fleming when the Champions Cup was introduced. The cup was awarded at the end of each 3 month season. It is now awarded on an annual basis to the O/60s team with the most points for the year (and from 2014 to the 'A' Division top scorer - Ed.). Merrill Lynch took over the sponsorship role in October 1996. Currently we have sponsorship of \$500 pa plus first aid kits from Greg Allen and caps, socks and balls from Barry Rutter.

A management committee took over administration of the club on April 29th, 1998, with the initial management committee consisting of George Winning (Chairman), Brian Lester (Treasurer), Peter Gason, and Dudley Younger. The unofficial secretary was Dudley's secretary Sandra Dale.

The new committee resolved the club name to be Wednesday Vintage Hockey. This was subsequently changed to Mid Week Vintage Hockey, and lately at the committee meeting on the 24th November 2010 to the current name of Wednesday Hockey Masters."

The inaugural team information we have is:

<u>White Team</u>: Peter Gardner (c), David Menzies (GK), Brian Stewart, Ray Cherrington, Harry Duncan, John Franks, Brian Young, Cecil Bogg, Fred Strother, John Gadsdon, Barry Angus, Kim Hawkins.

<u>Blue Team</u> Peter Gason (c), Bill Pickering(GK), George Winning, Ray King, Bill MacKintosh, Bill Williamson, Dudley Younger, George Orchard, Alan Blunt, Paul Robinson, T? Blake, Tony Barley.

Also relevant are the "Notes on the Competition" by Colin Sanders. Herewith an extract: "The initial 'Wednesday Veterans' competition commenced with two teams in the early 1990s and the 'result sheets' were not retained. However the overall results generally can be found on the relevant trophy. The competition increased over new players and progressed from 2 to 4 teams, thence to two divisions, each of 4 teams - an Over 60s and an Over 50s - commencing in April 2006 at the beginning of Round 2 of that year. Later for the 60s division 5 teams were introduced in July 2006 (the Greens), thence 6 teams in July 2007 (the Electric Blues)."

Peter Gason has added a couple more names to Bob's initial teams. We would still like to hear of anything which would add further to the historical record. It is noteworthy that Peter Gason, Paul Robinson, and Bill Williamson are still playing today. Ed.

John Mercer and Bob Bowyer have produced some documentation of the very latest events - which include the introduction of three divisions labelled 'A', 'B', and 'C', the start of a Saturday O/65 competition, and the end of the line for some of the shirt colours.
