

Editorial: Since the tournament it has been very noticeable that numbers are well down in all three divisions. Not all of this can be attributed to injury, as the number of long-term injuries mentioned by the division coordinators does not equate to the number of absentees. The possible problem if we continue to remain under-strength is that the quality of the competition will not be as high as usual, thus leading to more people deciding to give another Wednesday afternoon a miss.

In an editorial from the January 2013 issue I commented on the lack of movement between the then current divisions - O/50s and O/60s. "This would indicate that new recruits are not entering our competition at the lower end of the age scale." Not a lot has changed as per the 'C' div report to the last meeting: "As an O/50s comp we seem to need to get younger players. Our average age is probably in the late 50s. Not saying older ones need to leave but we need to bring in some younger ones to keep the comp viable for the future and to keep the quality of the comp high."

I concur fully with this suggestion. It is much better if we all can play in our own age group, and it is also preferable that our O/50s does not gradually become O/60s. Wholesale recruitment at all levels is not advocated, but it would be useful for all of us from the 'C' League with club links still in place to consider possible new players for Wednesday afternoons. Perhaps discuss this with your captain first. The rest of us ('A' and 'B' leagues) who know an uninjured WHM member who is not currently taking to the turf could find out why this is so. Readers' thoughts are very welcome. Let's keep our competition as by far the best regular geriatric hockey in Australia; and possibly the world.
