

Whistle While You Work - with Neil Mannolini :

Many thanks to Neil for the research which went into producing this piece. I hope that this clarifies the situation on "off the foot" for our readers and umpires.

Peter Ford has rightly pointed out that we are ignoring Rule 9.11 ... it simply states that the only time a penalty is awarded is when a player DELIBERATELY uses his foot to stop a ball ... but if it is not deliberate it should be play on ... regardless of where on the field this happens.

If a defender INSIDE the circle standing still has his foot hit by a ball I will award a Penalty Corner. I raised this issue with Richard Aggiss (former Australian coach and a long-serving member of the FIH Rule Board - he retired from this Board about a year ago). Here's what he outlined for me, and I share it with our Wednesday Masters.

"Hi Neil. This issue has been discussed endlessly during my 20 years on RAP and the Rules Board when as far ago as CCT in Brisbane (1992) when the then FIH President decided to advise the umpires & players the whistle wouldn't be blown if the ball hit the foot. Well, you can only imagine the turmoil as neither the players nor the HRB were consulted. This idea lasted 1 day - it apparently turned into a circus. Subsequently if the ball touches the foot in open play, then play on is signalled but in 90% of the time when the ball hits or touches the foot the umpires blow the whistle and the players accept that - the players argue the game is designed to be played with the stick - hence no handstop, etc. This always will be a grey area but generally well accepted by players. In my time players cannot & never have been allowed to stop the ball with the foot. Hope this helps - Richard."

I went on to Richard with... "Umpires always immediately blow a penalty corner when an attacking forward simply plays the ball onto the foot of a defender. It applies at all levels including first / senior division here in Perth (and all the international matches I've seen on TV). Has there ever been any intention from the Rules (FIH) body to clarify this tradition?"

Richard Aggiss's response: "Players wanted certainty so if it hits the foot of a defender in the circle it is a PC, so FIH went with the request from the players. At the moment there is no appetite for change to this rule as far as I am aware."

Aggiss is no longer on the FIH Board, but I am with the majority of umpires and will continue to award a Penalty Corner when the ball hits the foot of a defender INSIDE the circle.

Thanks again Neil. As an umpire I agree with you on awarding PCs for a foot inside the circle. For the rest of the field it does appear that everything is not cast iron, but requires common sense from both players and umpires. Off the foot was generally blown at all times in The Hague. Ed.

<u>Adelaide O/70s and O/75s:</u> Those of you with functioning memories (not sure about mine lately) may remember from our post tournament issue that a small gathering of 70s and 75s players was a possibility for the first half of 2015. This has been picked up by the Southern Cross hierarchy and generated the following email from Ric Roberts - co-convenor, to the SC London 70s team. Greetings all,

Some of you may have heard that there is some interest in the 70+ Australian Masters fraternity in holding a mini tournament of 70s & 75s players sometime early this year, in lieu of an international trip. The idea behind this is to provide some continuity of competition & camaraderie for this group between The Hague (2014) and the World Cup in Newcastle (2016). At this stage the suggestion has been to hold this in Adelaide, possibly in the week before Anzac Day (20-24th April) although these are by no means fixed dates.

If such a mini tournament was held this would provide us with an ideal opportunity to train together as a team prior to going away for the European Cup in August.

The plan at this stage would be something like having East (VIC, TAS, ACT, QLD NSW) versus West (WA, WA, SA, NT) selected teams in each of the 70s and 75s age groups with the Southern Cross 2015 70s as an additional (or one of the) team (s). The teams would play a round robin which would only necessitate playing (say) in the mornings or afternoons on 4 or 5 of the days, leaving plenty of time for touristy stuff.

I reckon to get to Adelaide and spend a week here will cost you at least \$1K, depending on how you get here and where you stay. So it will not be particularly cheap, although the wine is good.

Ric addressed this to the Southern Cross London (2015) O/70s. WA co-ordination is being done by Bill Williamson (O/75s) & Les Waldon (O/70s), who should be contacted to express interest.

The French Letter No 5: Well January has been quite a month. Apart from winter really settling in (we reached minus 11 one morning - now that was cold!) we had the terrorist attacks in Paris on the Charlie Hebdo newspaper & the Jewish supermarket. What a tragedy, what a community response.

Rule Changes For 2015: It was good to receive reader feedback, some opinions follow: Ken Beer: "I think we should recognise our reflexes are slow and we should minimise the risk of harm to opposing players by not adopting this rule change." (Stick above the shoulder) Chris Morley: "You asked for comment on the above-the shoulder rule for our age group - I'm inclined to the view that it shouldn't be adopted for WHM - the reaction time of some of our guys is not what it (probably) was and I think it could be dangerous in itself or lead to dangerous play. Do you know whether it's proposed to adopt this rule for the Masters National Champs in Cairns? If it is then I would change my opinion and support it as the guys would then have time to acclimatise."

For the benefit of our readers we reprint the changes, as they are all now effective for WHM Wednesday and Saturday matches with the exception of the stick above the shoulder. We have decided that we do not need this one.

The attacking team is permitted to take a free hit awarded within 5 metres of the circle at the point of the offence. As at present, the ball must move at least 5 metres - or it must be touched by another player from either team - before it can be played into the circle.

What is currently described as a corner (once upon a time a long corner) will now be taken from the 23 metre line directly opposite to where the ball crossed the back-line.

A green card will mean an automatic 2 minute suspension.

Allowing the stick to be raised above the shoulder to play the ball. Not for us.

The maximum length of a hockey stick is now 105 centimetres.

Repeated breaking at a penalty corner no longer leads to a penalty flick. This is because the penalty of despatching the erring player over the centreline is deemed sufficient.

Taking the ball 10 metres further forward has been removed from the rules on the grounds that it is no longer necessary with the self-pass rule.
