<u>A' Division Blog</u>: The usual post-tournament flatness is upon us. The 'C' division had two fully padded keepers but not enough players to do more than just have a hit around. Perhaps we need to think about not bothering to book both turfs for the first week after the interstate tournament.

October 19th: Numbers were improved to the point where we played the scheduled fixtures, with a few fill-ins necessary. Some of us were in need of hockey, some needed a rest after Adelaide, & one or two needed a lot more hockey after Adelaide. The standard varied, with the Blue team showing that even without Ivan Wilson they can pass the ball around. Sea gulls were in evidence in the circle (attacking) all day, with most goals coming from close range. Goal of the day has to go to Ash Foster for a 'deliberate deflection' which slowly rolled unimpeded into the corner. The three goalkeepers (Colin, Tony and Bill) all saw plenty of action, and made some fine saves. Player numbers on the day were: Blue (9), Gold (6), Red (8) and White (5). Goals scored 9.

October 26th: Both our numbers and our hockey continue to improve, but in both cases there is still room for more. Some players still seem to be in need of a run, while others have brought back some fine form from Adelaide. Peter Willett, Ian Lyon, Mal Horrigan and Ken Watt were amongst them, as were goalkeepers Bill, Colin and Tony who all made several excellent saves. They were aided by poor finishing by too many of us to mention. Peter Evans was also in fine touch. Stan Balding was reputed to have been one of two WA O/70s who went through the tournament without catching the virus - but suffered what appeared to be a glute injury quite early and had to stop. Turf Two looks like the summer home for 'A' division, and we look forward to the unimpeded sea breezes if and when the summer actually decides to begin. Player numbers were White (9), Red (7), Blue (8) and Gold (8). Only 5 goals were scored - all deserve a G.O.D. due to their rarity.

<u>Adelaide Impressions</u>: As has become customary for these events my personal opinions from within one of the O/70 sides follow. Gordon Jeffrey has a viewpoint from the O/65s in his piece, while the web-site <u>www.wavets.org</u> now provides a link to separate Facebook pages for all WA State teams.

<u>Trip Over:</u> The pre-flight announcements now include cautions against using Samsung S7 phones. It was a nice change to reach Adelaide in 2 hours 20 minutes. I then collected a hire car without a long wait in a queue and managed to drive directly to my accommodation without getting lost.

<u>Accommodation:</u> The CBD proved to be an excellent place to stay. Not only was there good access to any kind of restaurant desired, but it was very easy (on most days) to get out to the grounds at both Gepps Cross and Port Adelaide. WA Country had booked apartments in the Istay precinct, and it was possibly the best accommodation I have ever had at a tournament. (*A personal apartment*)

<u>Grounds</u>: Both venues had good playing surfaces and facilities. It should have been a really enjoyable tournament but the weather was totally without precedent. That's not just my personal opinion, but that of players who have been attending tournaments since the 1980s.

<u>Weather:</u> We did play in some fairly bad conditions, but several matches (about 20) were called off - quite correctly in my view. At our age it should not be obligatory to play in thunderstorms, gales and torrential rain. I hope everybody was back under cover before the power went out on the 28th & we all managed some kind of an evening meal. Mine was sandwiches (tinned tuna) and an apple. Sign of the Times: On an Adelaide CBD restaurant: "Closed due to shortage of electricity."

<u>Gala Dinner:</u> Had some good moments, and some not so good moments. The 6 piece band playing at full volume rendered conversation impossible at the start of the evening. But guest speaker Stephen Bradbury (winter Olympics gold medal winner) was very entertaining, as were comedy singing group 'The Three Waiters.' The music included Mozart, Verdi, Bizet, Puccini and Engelbert Humperdinck, all performed karaoke style. The weather was so bad we travelled the short distance back home by cab.

<u>WA Country Dinner</u>: This was held on the night following the gala dinner at the Cruising Yacht Club of South Australia, and as seems to be usual, was a great night. Lynn Dunnet's awards this year were limited to the 'Princess Award' and the 'Balls Up' award. The first needs no further explanation, but the second went to the WAC O/35s, for neglecting to inform the medics that their game had been cancelled. Apparently being the only people present at a darkened stadium on what was a very dark and stormy night can be rather hair-raising.

<u>Southern Cross AGM</u>: A quick AGM is usually an indication that an organisation is running well, and this one was no exception. Masters Matters has been able to keep you in touch with forthcoming tournaments. Nominations for Glasgow closed on October 31st and the teams are due to be made public on November 14th. The executive will start preparations for Barcelona as early as possible.

<u>Culture:</u> The WA Country O/70s may have only scored one goal, but we claimed a gold medal for the most cultured team present. The Musica Viva concert on October 5th and the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra on the 7th were attended by 10 & 12 of our players and spouses. This demonstrated one more benefit of staying in the CBD, as the Adelaide Town Hall was within easy walking distance.

<u>Full House</u>: On one of these nights George Bradbury went to park the vehicle while Mary joined the rest of the party in the restaurant. The car park allowed him to take a ticket and enter, when he was confronted by a "Car Park Full" sign - not placed in a very helpful position.

<u>Dear Editor</u>: Those of us who took advantage of the free "Adelaide Advertiser" where we stayed had a small surprise on discovering a 'Letter to the Editor' from Kenneth Beer of City Beach. Some expert comments on the power outage were included, as well as a plug for the hockey tournament.

<u>Restaurants</u>: The quality of the food and service was consistently good. Special mentions go to the Passatempo Cafe and Restaurant on Gouger St, the Nu Thai restaurant on Monmouth St, & Boomers on the Beach at Glenelg, which not only delivered a fine lunch of fish (garfish), chips, and salad but also offered a tea pot of Twinings Irish Breakfast with raw sugar (just like home for me).

<u>Tournament Tours</u>: My team managed a trip through the Adelaide hills, including a very good lunch at Hahndorf. We also went to the south coast, with another decent lunch at Victor Harbour before almost being blown away on the crossing to Granite Island. /8

<u>WA Wins:</u> It was pointed out to me that in the O70s all the medals went to West Australian keepers. Well done to Graeme Samson (Gold), Col Benporath (Silver) and John Burt (Bronze). Also the O/75s grand final resulted in medals to Bill Baldwin (Gold) and Barry Rutter (Silver).

<u>Post Tournament Tours</u>: I had booked a two day tour of Kangaroo Island after the tournament, and duly turned up at the Adelaide Central Bus Station at 6:15 am to be bussed to the ferry. At the Cape Jervis terminal we were given the bad news that all ferries had been cancelled for the day due to the weather. I met Len Blyth (WA 70s) and Keith Millar (ACT 65s and team mate in The Hague) who both had a car in the queue. We then were given a bus ride back to Adelaide and I looked for a room.

<u>Franklin Apartments</u>: This was where I had reserved a room for the next night, and they were able to admit me one night early; I was very happy with all aspects of the accommodation. However a tram trio to Glenelg Beach did not quite match the sights of Kangaroo Island. The wind was still blowing at gale force, and I had grave doubts whether the ferries would be sailing that day either.

<u>Adelaide Weather:</u> I have not seen the weather have such an impact on a tournament. To illustrate, I had ordered two after match drinks (light beer of course, as befits a responsible driver). Post-match hospitality was so limited due to the weather that I got two drinks - for the entire tournament. The rumour was that this was the result of our manager attempting budget repair for the team bus but we all decided that this was totally without foundation. Bus repair maybe, but that's another story, and what goes on tour stays on tour. Except for Roger Partington, who came home early for a grand final featuring one of his grand-daughters.

<u>Verdict:</u> Congratulations go to all involved with the organisation and conduct of the tournament. The elements did not co-operate at all, and to produce an enjoyable experience under the circumstances deserves great credit. I was part of a most congenial team who had a very good time, despite results. I would also have to say that Adelaide is a great place to have a very good time.
