<u>Vale Barry Angus:</u> In December we reported that Barry had moved to a nursing home. With regret we now acknowledge his passing on February 2nd. He was well known to all our Wesley players, as a long-time chaplain of the college, and a player for the Old Wesley club. The inaugural teams for our Wednesday competition were included in the "Masters Matters" edition for May 2014, and Barry was part of our White side. Our condolences go to his wife Molly, family and friends.

<u>Rule Changes 2017:</u> A new version of the rule book has been issued and it is already accessible from the Hockey WA web-site (well done). Sue Cook has ordered 30 printed copies from Hockey Australia but they may take time to arrive here. Sue also told me the FIH are intending to release a phone app of the rules - which will suit all the Cello-parkers. Until then we will have to read and remember.

The changes are either minor revisions, or refer to equipment. A brief overview:

Rule 1.10: "... No equipment or items, such as helmets, face masks, hand protectors, towels, water bottles etc. may be placed inside the goals."

Rule 4.2: States that any hand protection used by field players (in field play and defending penalty corners) must not increase the natural size of the hands significantly. Maximum sizes are specified. Field players may now wear knee pads for defending penalty corners, but they must be the same colour as the socks.

Rule 9.8: This deals with dangerous play ("Players must play the ball dangerously, or in a way which leads to dangerous play"), and the explanatory note now states: "A ball is also considered dangerous when it causes legitimate evasion action by players."

Rule 9.16: "... Following a penalty corner, if the ball hits any discarded equipment, such as a hand protector, knee pads or a face mask a free hit should be awarded if this occurs outside the circle, and a penalty corner awarded if this occurs inside the circle."

Rule 11.8: If the ball strikes an umpire, unauthorised person or any loose object on the field play continues (except as specified in the guidance to Rule 9.16).

The above should be a starting point only, as there are several other revised rules which have undergone cosmetic changes, and were not included here due to space restrictions.

<u>'C' Division Uniformity:</u> Last issue I commented that the teams are mainly playing in the correct WHM shirt now. From the vantage point of the bar again it appears that the socks are starting to match the shirts in most cases. Well done to Robin Bailey, Ian Pestana and the team captains. It helps if no fill-ins are necessary. Is there anybody out there who could send me an occasional report on the state of the hockey in 'C' division? At present only the 'A' and 'B' divisions are covered here.

A' Division Blog: February's topsy-turvy weather was matched by our topsy-turvy form.

February 1st: After the hot weather decided to take a break, numbers climbed to the point where bar discussion mentioned both a 5th team and the addition of a 'D' division. At this stage it's only bar speculation, and it's probable that injuries, weather and holidays will have an impact.

The hockey did not feature a single draw. Blue did not concede a goal in their three wins, but the Gold team had a bad day. Despite being competitive the goals refused to go in for them while a poor last 5 minutes against White saw them concede three goals for a 1-4 loss. Red also had trouble with the final touch, but their one goal for the day saw them defeat Gold 1-0. The standard of play was not great at the outset, with Red and White frequently passing the ball to their opposition. This improved once we warmed up and due to the numbers did not drop away in the later games.

Comebacks were made by Mark Faithfull, Len Blyth (in great touch - does the farm have a turf?) and Stan Balding. Eric Alcock, Mal Horrigan, Peter Murray, Phil Anderson and Peter Willett are all regaining some good form while Peter Dennis and Ham D'Souza continue to give defences a hard time. John Ree scored a hat trick, but goal of the day has to be shared by Peter Stevens (an absolute rocket of a shot from the right wing) and Bob Bowyer (a deceptive, angled, somewhat slower shot). A fine approach and lay-off to Ken Beer from Ham D'Souza is also worthy of mention. Approximate player numbers were White (13), Red (11), Blue (13) and Gold (13). Goals scored (11).

February 8th: The Blue and White high flyers came back to earth with a bump, each losing twice. Both Gold (2 draws) and Red (1 draw) were undefeated. It would be easy to attribute the losses to absent star players, but all sides were affected in this area. The Red team again featured an underage guest in John O'Donohue, who's over from Queensland visiting family and is on our mailing list. Welcome from "Masters Matters" and WHM. As usual, some of the hockey was very good and some was not. Hat tricks were scored by Ken Walter and John O'Donohue, but goal of the day was a joint award again with Peter Gason's penalty corner conversion and Ivan Wilson's reverse stick from the backline sharing the honours. There was some improvement in our attitude to umpires and one another, but we still have a lot more improving to do. Player numbers: Blue (11), Gold (10), White (11) and Red (10). The total goals scored were 11 again, despite the best efforts of the GKs.

February 15th: The weather produced a great impression of tropical humidity, but our good hockey still managed to evaporate very rapidly. This meant that goals were at a premium, and the obstinate refusal of the goalkeepers to make a mistake combined with some poor finishing resulted in one of our lowest scoring days since 'A' division began. Red and White failed to score, Ian Lyon got one for Gold from a fine Peter Gason pass to the post, and Ken Watt used his pace and skills to bag a couple close in from the right wing (he was immediately subbed off). Red were the unfortunate conceders of all three goals, despite their midfield short passing being as good as or better than all their rivals. Barry Rutter has to get a special mention for his fine game against White. At least the weather may have helped to increase the numbers in the air conditioned PHS bar. Visitors included Brian Stewart up from Busselton to test his fitness before Glasgow and Nevelle Brown who has played for Victoria, and Alliance in The Hague and Newcastle. In spite of the weather player numbers were good, the actual figures being; Red (11), White (13), Gold (12) and Blue (12). The 3 goals scored were not the lowest ever, just the equal lowest. We matched it on 17/06/2015, 25/03/2015, 04/03/2015, and just possibly a few times in 2014 before this section of the newsletter was started.

February 22nd: White did not dominate play but due to better finishing did the bulk of the scoring. Good performers in deep defence for Gold have included Glen Mihala, Ron Mitchell, Bill Rochester and Chris Morley whilst Blues deep defence has been marshalled by a variety of players as they shuffled the team behind Ray Norton (and those going on holidays) and included Graham Challenor, Alan Ledger, Jeff Kozak, Ted Allen, Rick Rodoreda and Dudley Evans. General Michael Gottschalk (aka Gorby) has been running a stringent defence for White making sure that the likes of George Burcher, Peter Sinclair, Gordon Jeffery and Dave Mellor stick to the team plan (whatever that may be).

Player numbers for the month were generally excessive especially weeks 1 and 2, by week 3 Blue (the holiday team of the month) was looking for subs and by week 4 were looking for several subs, whilst White averaged 13 attendees each week.

<u>Interstate Tournament:</u> As there is some space to fill, I will again question the necessity to continue holding this event during the school holidays. I also question the need to run one tournament for all age groups when it has become quite clear that the event is now unwieldy at its current size.

At the time the tournament began it was for O/40s only, and as many players had children of school age it made sense to travel during the school holidays, which were also the only time for school teachers to join the touring parties. At this stage the airlines and hotels had not yet begun the process of greatly increasing their prices during school vacations, and there were not as many people travelling. All these things have no changed, and the points I would make are:

- Lower travel and accommodation prices outside of school holidays.
- Splitting the tournament would permit more venues to conduct one.
- A smaller tournament would result in less matches at extreme times of the day. It would also mean that the tournament venue was still available for local play at some times of the day.
- The World Cups are very successful as separate events for O/40s to O/55s, and O/60s to O/75s. I can see no reasons why ours should not be successful also.

Finally, the reasons behind the loss of the rotation system have not been explained to rank and file regular players at the tournament. I fear that some may stop attending the event.

From The Saturday O/65s: We are still having a good time despite difficulties with the weather.

Play was cancelled on the 25th for only the second time since we started in the winter of 2013. The sea breeze arrived too late to prevent the Swanbourne temperature climbing to the high 30s.

Thank you to all the selectors and caterers for February. Especially Eric Alcock, who nominated as team captain a player who was not good enough to be selected in it. Non-playing captains works OK for the Davis Cup, and may be the way of the future to accommodate excess player numbers.

There are just four more weekends in March before the summer season officially comes to an end on April 1st, which is the last day of hockey & will be followed by the AGM dinner at the Herdsman's Hotel. Bookings will be essential for this - more details later.

Following this the winter season begins and we ask you for more money. We also lose some of our younger players to club hockey, and Howie and John get the chance for a day off. This does not apply to other members of the Committee, especially Jim, who will be busy feeding us.
