Our oldest member is John Milner, who at 91 still turns out regularly to play on Saturdays. Recognition should also be given to Bob Robinson and Ash Foster, both 86, and still playing regularly on Wednesdays. Our youngest member at 49 is Carlo Sorci – he's got a long way to go!

Our Club is very important for member's wellbeing. Socialising, and contact with other players is equally as important as physical exercise. So, remember after a hard day of Wednesday hockey to be patient when listening to a retired Accountant telling you how exciting his job was. Never underestimate the humour that occurs while playing hockey, and we should never take ourselves too seriously.

But where are we heading, what is our vision for the future, where do we want to be in 5 or 10 years? Just to be here is a good start, but what do we want to leave for future players, and just as important for them, what do they want. We currently have a small Committee headed up by Tony Jones who is looking at this very question with a view to formalizing a forward looking plan.

One suggestion is that the current over 40's Mid Week Masters be played at the Stadium on a Wednesday evening. Obviously such ideas need to be agreed upon as part of the overall plan.

This puts us in a very good bargaining position to pursue our preferred direction. So if you have ideas or suggestions, no matter how far outside the box they may be, by all means send them in. The more the merrier, they will all be considered. This is part of being a healthy evolving Club.

So, it's worth remembering that when it's pouring with rain, or scorching hot, and you're running around on the hockey field, there should be satisfaction in knowing you're out there and others your age aren't. If you're out there it means your body is going OK, so be happy in your mind and spirit, have a wonderful break over Christmas, raise a glass, and we will see you all, refreshed, and ready for more in the New Year."

January 21st: Only the Red team had a full quota (1 extra) with all other sides being 2 or 3 short even after Bob Bowyer made a long-awaited re-appearance and was drafted to Gold. Welcome back Bob. As a consequence it was noticeable that the standard of play fell away as players drained their reserve of energy filling in. Red took full toll of this, winning the last two games of the day decisively (both 2-0). Matches had been fairly evenly contested up until then, with the quality of the fill-ins being decisive. Angelo Strano was much in demand here and seemed to be on the field all day. It was good to see four goalkeepers again (Barry, John, Tony and Ian) who each played behind the same defence all day. The afternoon continues to provide good hockey for those who play, and a shady vantage point for those don't. The grandstand consists of portable chairs and some really like to do it in style, with drink cup holders in their seats. No wonder that the attendance by our non-players is so good. (The drinks are not alcoholic, and the bar does not provide waiter service to the ground)

It appears that we have so many players that it's a long time between being rostered as the duty selector. That's the only reason I can think of for players consistently arriving late. The selection task is difficult enough without having to revamp all your draft sides for latecomers. Could all of us do our best to arrive at Perry Lakes by 1:30 pm. This will make it much easier to start the games on time.

The Committee has considered the possibility of having to run 4 teams and done some planning. Using 2 fields would entail some extra costs for ground marking, require 4 goalkeepers and 4 umpires and play would finish earlier than it does now. We get by with one playing surface on Tuesday/Wednesdays and with this arrangement would have to play shorter games.

This summer the shirts on the field have displayed quite a variety of non-standard blues, greens and whites. If you are a regular player and you don't have all the WHM shirts then please contact Jim Wright who has some stock. I have also noticed that the old maroon shirts still appear off the field at times - perhaps these could come in handy if a fourth team becomes necessary.

Perhaps it's time to clarify our policy on casual players. The basic principle is that players can have up to three weeks play for a casual payment of \$50, or one week for \$20. Further play requires that the balance be paid. The Committee reserves the right to apply discretion and will generally allow an overseas or interstate visitor to play once as a guest. The same applies to potential new players, who want to try before they buy.

The fee structure for Saturdays differs from Wednesdays in that we have two distinct and separate seasons. Quite a few of our summer players are still having a run with the Hockey WA O60s in winter and it would not be fair to charge them for a whole year. So that's why we ask you to pay twice during a calendar year and your \$100 entitles you to plenty of hockey.in both summer and winter.

In recent weeks apparently successful comebacks have been made by Eric Alcock and John Milner; well done to you both. The John Mercer comeback is still very much a work in progress, and the skill levels being displayed on the field might frighten him off too.

There have been suggestions that we should introduce a local unofficial rule that any forwards who miss a shot at goal (particularly at the northern end) should travel the distance and retrieve tha ball themselves. It happened on January 18th - well done Don Sanders.

Typically each team is running with 2 or 3 on the bench so there is even talk of making a fourth side! This month's featured player is Arch currently running as a winger for the White side as well as running the side.

Peter Andrews Hockey Journey:

1958, Grade 7 at a new school with a new name, red head Peter Andrews joins the comics and becomes Arch(ie). Also at 12, the beginning of my hockey journey. 2020 and I'm still trying to better understand the game. In between there's been a lot of hockey.

1962-3. I played 1st XI at school, 2 years at fullback. We weren't very good. Probably why the mighty Whites go pale if I lob down there. Cricketers in Under 15s & 18s with Ken Walter (I next played with Ken at Wolves). After school, a couple of years playing crap hockey for Uni in Z grade, but no progress. Then back to the Christ Church Old Boys in its A3 (top) side as a winger. Few skills but I could run. Al Ledger and I are the only players from this team still playing.

Early 1970s, my hockey was hindered by work in the bush as a geologist. I gave that up and went back to Uni to study law for another four years; I qualified but never practised as a lawyer. Looking back I seem to have spent well over 30 years, mainly creating, funding and managing junior exploration companies from start-ups to ASX-listed.

A few years as Club President and Selector for Christ Church. Played down the grades in 2B & 4B. 1978, a mug for most goals scored. 1984-5, I was playing in the first 'Masters' named competition, over 35s. 1984, Christ Church joined old foes Scotch to become Collegians, then in 1987 Cricketers joined and we became Westside Wolves.

1986, turning 40 I'm into then called Veterans, where I became a player and manager of our 40s Div 1 team. 2019 and I'm still the Manager of my Wolves 60s Masters' team. At least mobile phone and internet have improved player chasing half an hour before a game. The years go on and Wolves 55-60s have won 9 premierships in 11 years. Plenty of talent with ex State and A grade players, but we have faded (quite) a bit in the last few years. Last year we won the 60s Div 2 flag, the 7th best 60s side. The team has got older. Nice to see several of the Wolves 60s are playing Wednesdays in B Div. Chris, Morgs, Ledg, Speedie, Ross, Arch, BT & Heath.

For the record, I'm married to Kelly, with 4 adult children/step children and 10 grandchildren between us, mostly teenagers. My son, a son-in-law and 2 grandchildren play hockey. Christmas Eve just gone was a full house of 20 for dinner as the family united from WA, Victoria and California. Pretty much a riot for a few weeks. Escape to hockey!

I have played some night hockey seasons at Hale and PHS2. Can't remember when.

I had heard about Wednesday hockey, so about 2009 and slacking off from work to a home office with more free time, I joined the winning Electric Blues. Since the WHM structure changed I've been B White Captain for a few years.

2012 I filled in for WA 65s in Hobart, a 'contract player' for 5 games and a Silver Medal. More State hockey and a 70s Gold Medal last year. 5 times a Southern Cross player for a gold and a silver. I was an Australian touring player in 2017 from Copenhagen to Swansea; a great experience. I was selected for last year, but did not tour. At 70, I finally surpassed my Dad who was a WA State player before and after the War and Captain in 1948. Later as an Australian Umpire, Dad used to umpire Vern.

Since joining WHM I've learned more about the game than any time before. I reckon I have a 'few' more skills, proving that you can improve with a bit of effort. I seem to have about 3 or 4 coaches whenever I play. This must help? Seriously though, personal coaching from Jim Banks has worked for me. Thanks Jim.

I am currently Secretary of the WA Masters Hockey Committee and will also look after the Men's Masters Local Competition matters for the Committee this year. We exist mainly to promote WA Masters Hockey and to assist and recommend matters to HWA. We organise and select Masters State Teams, both Men and Women.

Hockey is a non-contact sport. Over 60 years of fractured toes, split shins, a couple of hammys, a calf, broken fingers and thumb, 2 lots of fractured ribs, 2 broken collar bones and 1 dislocated, expensive front teeth (before mouthguards), blood and bruises. <u>Whistle While You Work:</u> Goalkeeper Colin Benporath has requested coverage of the obstruction rule. Goalkeepers can be obstructed too, and often are. So hereunder are Rules 9.12 and 9.13.

<u>Rule 9.12:</u> Players must not obstruct an opponent who is attempting to play the ball.

Players obstruct if they:

- Back into an opponent
- Physically interfere with the stick or body of an opponent
- Shield the ball from a legitimate tackle with their stick or any part of their body.

A stationary player receiving the ball is permitted to face in any direction.

A player with the ball is permitted to move off with it in any direction except bodily into an opponent or into a position between the ball and an opponent who is within playing distance of the ball and attempting to play it.

A player who runs in front of or blocks an opponent to stop them legitimately playing or attempting to play the ball is obstructing (this is third party or shadow obstruction). This also applies if an attacker runs across or blocks defenders (including the goalkeeper) when a penalty corner is being taken.

[I find the words used in the rule are quite clear. Especially the one about players who shield the ball from a legitimate tackle with their stick or any part of their body.]

Rule 9.13: Players must not tackle unless in a position to play the ball without body contact.

Reckless play, such as sliding tackles and other overly physical challenges by field players, which take an opponent to ground and which have the potential to cause injury should attract appropriate match and personal penalties.

[This one also seems to be fairly frequently breached in our hockey. The rule makes it abundantly clear that any body contact while attempting a tackle is a breach and must be penalised according to where it occurs on the field, and whether it is considered intentional by the umpire.]

<u>Punology Two:</u> Baby puns are childish but great puns are full groan.
