'A' Division Blog: The issue of the moment seems to be whether the 25 minute games are too long. They were initiated to make sure everybody got a run when all teams had good numbers. And in very late news the July 1st numbers were Blue (12), Gold (12), Red (10) and White (15).

June 3rd: A few players may have joined 'B' Division, who appeared to have large numbers down on Turf Two. This left just 9 of us to have a hit (and a mishit or two) on Turf One. We lacked the stamina to last the full 2 hours and we lacked the hearing ability to comprehend all the drills properly. Many thanks to Ham D'Souza, who conducted an excellent training session.

June 10th: It was a strange day. Players on the White team list scored 6 goals and players on the Blue team list scored 1 goal. Blue won 3 matches and White lost 3 matches. The reason was that the White side supplied the fill-ins and was top-heavy with forwards. Blue had a stable defence but were short of forwards with Gold being the other way around. Some of us seemed to have remained fit. Blue had the only defence capable of blunting the Red juggernaut and held them scoreless. Gold and White did not. Goalkeepers Barry, Colin and John all played very well but the play was so uneven that weight of numbers told in the end. The judges decided that goal of the day should be shared by Brian Soares deflection and Ian Purdie's well placed hit - for Gold. The results are very indicative:

June 17th: Despite the rather dire weather forecast play got underway on time and numbers were very reasonable. The heavens opened for games 2 & 3 which were both watched by the White team safely under cover. This may have given them an advantage for the next two games, which was the first time since resumption that they had not lost. Red and Blue (who were the non-playing sides) disappeared during the second last match (except for umpires Bob Maley and Jim Wright) and the last game of the day was not played. Gold welcomed back midfield dynamo Angelo Strano, Blue welcomed back speedster Peter Dennis (until injured) and White welcomed back Australian defender Len Blyth and Robin Bailey. On the other hand Red were brought back to the field by the absence of several players from the previous week, including Ray Domingo, Mark Faithfull, and John Jeffreys. The results were mainly close with the only exception being the Gold versus Red match where Gold ran to an early three goal lead before Red found their team work, but their recovery only produced one goal. The day's results:

White 1 Blue 2; Gold 3 Red 1; Gold 1 Blue 1; Red 0 White 1; Gold 0 White 0; Red/Blue not played.

Scorers: **Blue:** Nevelle Brown (3). **Gold:** Scott Blackwell, Phil Metcalf, Ken Walter. **Red:** Bob Maley. **White:** Roy Grant, Peter Wallis. These include several guesses as there were some scrambles. Players came and went but approximate team numbers were: White (13), not including non-playing captain Dave Horsley, Blue (9), Gold (8), Red (8). 10 goals were scored.

June 24th: The tally of goals scored would seem to indicate that the goalkeepers had a bad day. But all of them (Ian, Barry, Colin and John) made some excellent saves and in my opinion it was the defences who had the bad day. The passing was frequently (but not always) not great again but that did not bother some forwards who had field days on the scoreboard. I noted 12 individual umpires which means that nobody had to do more than one game - well done to coordinator and captains. White had so many players that when Robin Bailey arrived from distributing uniforms on Turf 2 he was unable to get a game. So he went back to work distributing uniforms. Ken Beer played with Red and Gold added Rob Ainsworth. The day's blowout was Blue's 2-0 win over Red, who have trouble scoring against Blue's full backs. White and Blue played out a 5 goal thriller with the winner coming inside the last 20 seconds and all the other games were draws. The results were:

Red 1 Gold 1; White 3 Blue 2; White 1 Gold 1; Blue 2 Red 0; White 2 Red 2; Blue 0 Gold 0.

Scorers: **Blue:** Nevelle Brown, Ian Hill, Neil Miller, Ricky Watts. **Gold:** Ian Purdie, Ken Walter. **Red:** Ray Domingo (3). **White:** Ham D'Souza (3), Peter Wallis (3). Some of these are guesses again. My best estimates of the team numbers: Red (9), Gold (9), White (14), and Blue (9). 17 goals were scored, but the judges were unable to select a goal of the day from so many.

From Saturday Masters: Well done to committee and players for being so quick off the mark that we were able to resume on the first Saturday after the restrictions were lifted.

Numbers have been excellent throughout June, even running to four teams and four goalkeepers on the 20th. The three teams on the 27th played on through the rain and the newly purchased club tarpaulins (thanks to Jim Wright) kept the hockey bags dry.

The new method of selection appears to be working very well. It certainly must be better than the unfortunate duty selector having to redo all his teams due to some late arrivals. If all of us make sure that we respond to Jim's email we are more likely to play in well-balanced teams.

Thank you to all of you who have paid your fees already. We have 41 people who have paid a full season \$80, including a couple of casual players who paid the full amount and one who paid \$100. There were 14 social and casual payments (including a goalkeeper) as well as 2 goalkeepers.

The AGM has been deferred to October. We intend to combine it with the end of season dinner and it will be easier to reserve the YMCA clubrooms after the Hockey WA winter season is over.

Marty Greay has retired as a player, but will continue as a social member. The way I feel I might be doing the same very soon. Look forward to catching up at Perry Lakes.

Keith Platel - Hockey history (or lack thereof!)

I am somewhat embarrassed to have been asked to pen these few words. After reading other players' detailed achievements over a lifetime of hockey at the highest grades, I really think there is little of interest that I can write!

My earliest recollections of hockey are when my elder brother started at Wesley in 1959 and I would go and watch the games on a Saturday morning. So it was a natural progression when I started at Applecross High 2 years later that I chose hockey as the winter sport. I never played club hockey on the weekends and by the time I left school was totally taken with spearfishing all over the state so stopped playing. My midweek sport was recreational squash.

In 1982 my squash partner was transferred to the country so I looked around for another sport and decided a team sport was more attractive and the only team sport I knew anything about (or so I thought) was hockey. So I went down one night to Willetton training, discovered that there were no tramlines, no roll-ins from the side line but unfortunately still that horrible often misinterpreted rule of offside!

I played grade 6B - I don't think there was any lower grade – then, as time went by, 40s and 50s. The players I recall from the time I played at Willetton include Robin Bailey, Bill Campbell, John Chapman and Heath Tyrrell. Around 2003, Willetton struggled with numbers for its 50's team so I rang around the clubs and found places for all our players so they could continue playing. The logical choice was Melville where I and 5 others ended up.

I joined WHM about 12 years ago and it has been the best hockey decision I have made. I was immediately made welcome, despite my obvious lack of hockey skills (I can't imagine what Michael Nobbs thought when I was put in his team)! I recall starting after Christmas on a 40 degree day, not having touched a stick since the end of the season. The encouragement over the years and the times that people have taken me aside and actually shown me what I should be doing on the field have been greatly appreciated.

There are many people from WHM whom I owe a lot to, but perhaps none more than Jimmy Banks. 4 years ago on the day after my wife's funeral Jim asked me to play in the State 65's in Adelaide. That commitment really helped me through a very difficult time and was the start of me taking my hockey to a different level. We won gold that year, were decimated by injury in Ballina and then won gold again last year in Bunbury. It also gave me the confidence to nominate for Southern Cross where I have totally enjoyed playing in Japan and Belgium.

Hockey is now a very significant part of my life. It gives me the commitment to keep up a level of fitness, it surrounds me with wonderful people from all walks of life and it gives me a reason to get up in the morning.

Thank you all for the opportunity.
