WA Named To Host Interstate Tournaments in 2023: On 29th September Hockey WA and the State Government jointly announced that Western Australia had secured the hosting rights for several of the interstate tournaments between 2022 and 2025. This will include both the Men's and Women's Masters Championships for 2023 as well as the FIH Pro league in 2024. The actual venues and dates are yet to be confirmed. Physiotherapy Appointments at Reduced Rates:

From time to time in the past, we have advertised the availability of physiotherapy appointments for WHM members at reduced rates, in circumstances when physiotherapists require patients for their training. In this case there are 2 qualified physiotherapists who are undertaking specialised training in Sports and Musculoskeletal Physiotherapy at Curtin University. If anyone is putting up with an injury/pain problem there is an opportunity to have it assessed and treated at a discounted rate of \$50 (health fund rebates can also be claimed). The initial consultation would be approximately 90 minutes and any follow up appointments of 30 minutes. The physiotherapists will be assessing and providing treatment under supervision from Andrew McIntyre of Applecross Physiotherapy. Appointments are available from 1-4pm on Mondays and Wednesdays for the next five weeks.
