Many thanks from all who were there to Bob Claxton, who not only made the presentation, but also had obtained some very useful videos from the recent Olympics to provide actual examples as aids to the discussion. For the technically minded the instructions from Bob for viewing the videos on the Dropbox app appear below:

Copy the above URL into your browser address line (Chrome etc) then hit return to access the dropbox file. You will get a message that the file is too large to preview so you need to find the download symbol (most likely at the top right) and download it to a folder. Once downloaded you can then go to the folder you have downloaded the file then open the presentation.

I picked up a couple of points, which I think are relevant to current A Division matches:

- The only signals which require two arms are to indicate a penalty corner, penalty stroke, or a goal. All others should be one only, even a long corner, which is one arm after the other.
- Both umpires should be involved in the game at all times. If the ball is at your colleague's end that does not mean that you can switch off and relax. You provide another line of sight which might be able to help your partner if he becomes unsighted by a mass of players. It is also your responsibility to control your entire sideline.

Thanks to George Bradbury for arranging the event. It is good to see that there are quite a few of us in A Division who are prepared to take an interest in the rules. Some correspondence has arrived from one of our regular umpires on the subject of several of the rules recently prominent in our A Division matches. The "Rules 'R Us" section can be found on Page 8.

To A Division Umpires: We've recently talked about the use of cards in our games, if warranted. If any of our Turf 1 umpires would like to be properly equipped for this purpose George has acquired a set of umpiring cards and they can be obtained from John Mercer in the technical dugout.

<u>City versus Country</u>: In the last issue we thanked the principal organisers for the City teams but did not include the Country off-field people. <u>Rules 'R Us</u>: Many thanks to Ken Watt for taking the trouble to highlight a few rules which have caused some discussion in our A Division matches during recent weeks. Any of our readers who want to join the discussion are welcome.

Windy Woof: " in response to the concern of Terry Gaston (and possibly others) regarding when and if a penalty should be ascribed.

F I H Rules of Hockey 9.1 states: 'Players must not intimidate or impede another player', is (in my opinion) applicable. If a player in possession of the ball feints or gives the impression that he is about to strike the ball but does not and the defender takes evasive action by either ducking, turning away or any other matter of evasion to avoid being struck , he has been intimidated into so doing and a penalty is applied.

This is distinct from a player intending to strike the ball and either topping or missing the ball completely which must be viewed as accidental and not intentionally intimidating, therefore in this case players should proceed with caution.

This is my interpretation and some may disagree." *I am in total agreement with Ken here. Ed.*

Breaking at Penalty Corners: Hi John, if you would not mind would you please include these in the next edition of MM. I certainly do not present myself as any manner of authority on the rules but these two have been highlighted lately.

Rule 13.7 b states: "The player taking the push or hit feints at playing the ball. The offending player is required to go beyond the centre line but is replaced by another attacker; the penalty corner is taken again. If this feinting leads to what otherwise would have been a breach of this rule by a defender, only the attacker is required to go beyond the centre line."

Rule 13.7 c: "If a defender other than the GK crosses the back line before permitted, the offending player is required to go beyond the centre line and cannot be replaced by another defender."

Something we all know, however, if two or more players break it is only the first player to break that is penalized. (We seem to need to know about this one. Ed.)
