'B' Division February 2022:

After the Xmas break and the searing heat of January most players were looking forward to February and some cooler weather. With players gradually appearing out of the woodwork and their private Covid burrows Wednesday hockey was almost back to "normal". Pretty much full teams were once again on the park and the hockey was much improved because of it!

A highlight throughout February has been the continued high quality and array of skills shown by our goalies. All have featured prominently in the outcome of each game with the general consensus that we are lucky to have them! I agree with that sentiment otherwise one of us may have to put on the pads and stand nervously in the goal!

This month's featured player is Stefan Olejko. Stefan has only been amongst the Wednesday Masters group for a few months but is already a regular at left half for the White side.

A Lifetime of Hockey by Stefan Olejko

In late 1963 my parents made the bold decision to leave the town of Accrington in Lancashire, England and to migrate to Australia. At that time I was 11 years old and had spent most of my life in Accrington- a town famous for its textiles and cotton industries, the hardest bricks in the world, the Accrington Pals (a WW1 regiment at the Battle of the Somme) and of course the Accrington Stanley Football Club (check out the infamous milk ad on YouTube).

During a wet and cold December we left England from the port of Southampton and arrived in Perth four weeks later to much warmer weather. The town of Narrogin was our next destination, a wheat and sheep farming district famous for its local brickyard industry and its Clinker bricks. I was enrolled at Narrogin Senior HS & after surviving those hot Summer months I wanted to start playing sport again but was disappointed to find out there were only two choices. There was 'Football'...but not the football I was used to. Try as I might, lunchtime kick-to-kick was just too difficult- kicking an odd-shaped ball, being allowed to catch and then punch the ball with your fist, or being called on to kick a 'torp' or a 'drop punt'....and don't get me started on those crunching rugby-style tackles!

The other choice was another game that I had never heard of. A game with an odd-shaped stick curved at the bottom that was flat only on one side. I could not understand why they didn't just make both sides flat to hit that rock-hard ball with. Surely both sides of the stick being flat would be easier... Luckily hockey did have similar rules to English Football: 11-a-side, offside rules, goalies, and getting whacked in the shins. I made my decision and never looked back!

Since I was enjoying hockey for school sport I joined a Junior Club: the Warriors. We played against the Olympics and the Riffs, as well as teams from smaller regional towns like Pingelly. I became very adept as a Left Inner and enjoyed the thrill of scoring many goals whist playing on the unusual surface of clay. Another strength of mine was the 'roll in'. None of this pushing or hitting the ball from the sideline like they do today!

Towards the end of my first season Narrogin nominated for the Upper Great Southern Junior Hockey Carnival where teams as far south as Albany and as far west as Bunbury competed. Narrogin nominated two teams and to my disappointment I was not selected in the No1 team, though I was made captain of the No2 team and I played as Centre Forward. We won our first two games 5-0 and yours truly scored all 10 goals, but I didn't score in the next game and we went down 3-1 to the team that won the championship. Despite the disappointment of not being champions I was delighted to win the trophy for leading goal scorer of the carnival.

I continued to play hockey throughout high school and in my final year our coach, Mr Lewis, decided to nominate a team to play in the A-grade Men's competition. This was quite a challenge as we were pitted against physically stronger and more experienced players. On top of that, after years of playing on clay, we had to get used to playing on a brand new surface called "grass". However, thanks to our coach's experience we developed into a very competitive team that made it all the way to the grand final. Sadly we lost by a narrow margin, but still gained the respect of the much older teams. This was my first year playing as a Half Back and enjoyable as it was I missed the many opportunities of playing in the forward line.

After finishing high school, teaching beckoned as a career so I moved from Narrogin to Perth to attend Claremont Teachers College in the early 1970's. I only played hockey occasionally, filling in at the Fremantle Hockey Club (Fremantle Park these days, next to the Aquatic Centre). In my final year of teacher's college a team was put together to play in the A-Reserve Metro Comp and we were coached by Bryan Rourke, our PE lecturer. I believe he was playing for The Old Mods and went on to represent WA and Australia. This was another great learning curve because most of our team was brought up in regional areas so each Saturday there would be people missing who had travelled home for the weekend. Also, as our coach had his own hockey commitments we would often be coaching ourselves. My most vivid memory would be the day it was my turn to fill in as goalie as we didn't have a regular in that position. Despite being a few players down the first half went well- we played a very defensive setup and I made a couple of spectacular saves (Not bad for a part-timer...) so that we went in to half time nil all. During the second half we tired and the flood gates opened; their shots were relentless and they took out the game 5 - 0. Since that day 50 years ago I have had the utmost respect for anyone who pulls on the goalkeeper pads whether at Junior or Senior level!

For the following 40 years I played a variety of sports: Basketball, squash and indoor cricket as well as coaching basketball at club and state level. As a primary school teacher and PE specialist I also coached inter-school teams in every possible sport or athletics program that a school can offer. I also maintained my interest in hockey throughout the years, playing for Madora Bay in the Mandurah League, Rockingham Redbacks Vets on grass, and the mid-week comp on Garden Island Naval Base (Pre-9/11 of course, sadly you can no longer pull up and yell out "Hockey mate" and be waved through). In the last decade I've been fortunate enough to play state hockey for WA Metro in Canberra and WA Country in Bunbury, and now, thanks to meeting Dudley at a Pilates class, I have joined the Mighty Whites in the Curtin Vets competition. I've enjoyed so many memorable hockey games across Western Australia over the years and look forward to many more to come!

Thank you Dudley and Stefan. The differing paths we took to WHM are fascinating. Ed.


