The WA Masters Hockey Committee is a committee of Hockey WA and is responsible to the Management of Hockey WA and encompasses all matters relating to Masters Hockey and Masters Hockey State Teams.

I acknowledge and congratulate all Committee Members' for their enormous enthusiasm, energy and significant contributions throughout the year.

Three members of the current Committee Keith Gilbride, Scott Macdonald and Peter Connolly have each completed their elected 3 year term. Scott Macdonald retires and offers himself for re-election to the committee to be held at the 2019 Annual Meeting. Keith Gilbride and Peter Connolly have decided to retire from the committee.

As the Charter specifies, the Committee has significant advisory and operational responsibilities. In its advisory capacity, the Committee provides advice to Hockey WA management and staff on a wide range of local competition issues and policies, and the development of Masters Hockey for the hockey community. Its operational responsibilities encompass the selection of Coaches, Managers and Players to participate in the annual Australian Masters Championships, this year held in Bunbury/Busselton W.A. for the Men's Teams and The Gold Coast Queensland for the Women's Teams, and the significant associated logistical arrangements in sending 18 teams to the Championships

Local Competition

Significant changes were made to the Masters competitions for the 2019 season. These changes included:

- Sharing of mid-week competition nights (Monday and Wednesday) between Men and Women
- Changes to the automatic age dispensation rules for almost all age groups
- FIH and HA required a mandatory move to playing games in 17.5 minute quarters rather than 35 minute halves.

A survey will be sent to Hockey WA registered players from the age of 30 and up early in the 2020 season, the content will be similar to the survey conducted in 2017 so that the effect of these changes and potential other areas of interest or concern of the local Masters playing group can be collected and analysed. It was originally intended that this survey would be distributed at the end of the 2019 season, however, technical issues and changes at Hockey WA meant that achieving this goal was not feasible.

Using lessons learned from the 2017 survey, WAMHC will notify clubs well in advance, minimum several weeks, of the distribution of the survey. WAMHC will distribute any findings and recommendations to clubs for comment as part of a consultation period prior to any implementation of change that might be indicated by the results of the survey.

Results for the Championships were Over 35, Gold Medal, Over 40, Silver Medal; Over 45, Gold Medal; Over 50, Gold Medal; Over 50 Division 2, Silver Medal; Over 55 Division 1, Bronze Medal; Over 55 Division 2, Silver Medal; Over 60, Gold Medal; Over 65, Bronze Medal; Over 70, Gold Medal; Over 75, Silver Medal.

The performance of the WA Masters Hockey Men's Teams in 2019 continues to demonstrate our ability to perform above expectations for the size of our player base and shows the strength of our local competition, our Selection Policies and Procedures and team preparation. We believe this is due to an unusually low number of players offering themselves for selection and teams going away under strength. Thanks to the umpires Dave Ferguson and Sulette Le Roux, and the technical bench for allowing the girls some good game practise. Thanks to Allison Rieck for coaching and Pat Scott for managing. A huge thank you to Temeka Curley for coaching the Sri Lankan team all week (against Mods and the 35's). After the game on Friday a supper was held in the Eastman Lounge and gifts provided by the 35's was accepted with gratitude.

The Sri Lankans then headed to Narrogin to play a team from the Upper Great Southern Association. The girls were billeted out to the team for the night and had true country hospitality.

Committee Outlook

The Committee makes a significant contribution to the development of Masters Hockey in WA to meet the needs of participants. This work is undertaken with volunteers.

The committee could not deliver these results without the support of Hockey WA and I would like to acknowledge and thank the Hockey WA Board, CEO Stuart Gilsenan and the staff of Hockey WA for their considerable assistance throughout the year. WAMHC would particularly to thank Jason Butcher who during the year conducted a coaching clinic for all WA Masters Coaches, attended by 10 coaches, and a question and answer session which was very well received.

The Committee has been very stable throughout 2019 operating with a complete committee of 10. The appointments made at the 2018 General Meeting maintained or increased the diversity of participation in committee decisions by geographic location, age and club affiliation while strengthening the skill set of the committee.

Significant changes in the committee structure are likely into 2020 with the retirement of Keith Gilbride, a long time stalwart of the committee whose contribution in all areas will be missed. Keith has for many years been the driving force behind the Masters Men's State Teams and a strong advocate for more transparent selection processes and governance.

My own retirement from the committee will see a change in leadership which will undoubtedly bring a change in the focus of the committee. WAMHC will elect the new Chair from their peers at the first committee meeting of 2020.

I have no doubt that WAMHC will continue to have a strategic focus on the creation and nourishment of an environment and culture which continues to increase the number of players and to improve the experience for all of those players participating in the game of hockey at all levels.

In closing it has been a privilege to serve on the WA Masters Committee since 2012 and as Chairman for the past 3 years. I wish all of you every success in 2020.
