Western Hockey Masters AGM: Well done to our executive on their careful preparation for our first ever general meeting as an incorporated body. And well done to the members who attended, made submissions, supplied proxies and apologized if unable to be there. WHM Secretary Neil Patterson has circulated the minutes to all members, but here are some highlights.

Election of Officer Holders: No further nominations were received at the meeting. The results were:

President: Simon Thomson.

Secretary: Neil Patterson.

Treasurer: Steve Farrar.

Vice President / General Member: Tony Jones.

Number of Ordinary Committee Members: This has to be approved at the AGM according to the Constitution. The Chairman nominated an additional 7 positions, these being Assistant Secretary, 3 Divisional Representatives, the Masters Matters Editor, the Saturday Representative and Financial Administrator. These were all endorsed by the meeting.

Structural Reform Proposal: After debate the motion was lost. Speakers against argued that WHM is an enjoyable social operation, not a formal competition, & bylaws would just complicate our procedures. It was also noted that the proposal made no significant changes to current practices and that formalizing the proposal at an AGM would unnecessarily restrict operations in specific cases where they proved not to be practical. The numbers against were decisive.

The meeting began at 5:30 pm and concluded just before 6:00 pm.

MM's limerick writer decided to comment, as several attendees occupied the settees instead of the plastic chairs in the meeting room. See page 3.

Defibrillators: A recent event at Charles Riley (May 25th) highlighted the need for us all to know where the nearest potential life-saver is located. We have our own at Perry Lakes on Saturdays and YMCA have just located theirs on the outside wall of the rooms. At PHS the Turf 1 defib can be found in the Technical dugout and I usually confirm that it is unlocked before play starts. On Turf 2 it is in the store room to the north of the dugouts and it might be a good idea if the early arrivals could make sure that it is accessible. Hopefully none of them will ever be needed.

Ice at PHS: The machine which used to dwell in the main tunnel has been refurbished and relocated. Its new home is via the tunnel at the north-west end of PHS 1 and through the small door on the left just before the large sliding door. This door is not always unlocked, unfortunately.

World Cup 2020 Dates: There has been a change in the timing of the Tokyo event. On May 28th the Australian Masters web-site carried the information that the tournament dates have been changed to November 5th to 15th instead of the original October. The reason is that the Olympics will have three turfs, and the third turf was unavailable in the original time slot due to post Olympic works. The revised list now reads:

O/35 and O/40: Men and Women. England - August 8th to 17th.

O/45 and O/50: Men and Women. South Africa - September 19th to 29th.

O/55 Men. O/55, O/60, O/65 Women. Spirit of Masters. South Africa - September 19th to 29th.

O/60, O/65, O/70, O/75 Men. Tournament Trophy. Japan November 5th to 15th.

Comment: Will three turfs be enough to run a full Tournament Trophy competition? Will Southern Cross and England LX be limited to one team? When will our 2020 interstate tournament happen? Any developments from the web-sites will be reported here.

'A' Division Blog: It is noticeable how the results fluctuate depending on who's there (& who's not!)

May 22nd: The Red team would be dominating the competition, but they have a problem scoring against Gold and lost both games 1-0. Gold also beat Blue 1-0 and drew 0-0 with White to end up as the best performed team. Red beat both White and Blue in good style. Neither White nor Blue won a match, and drew twice with each other. Some very good hockey was played but not all the time. Perhaps some of the passing can be explained by the fact that we are still becoming accustomed to new team-mates, and the high player numbers mean that settled positions are a rarity in all sides. As a possible consequence goals were scarce all day. Gold's scorers were Ken Walter, Steve McEntee after a fine build-up and Bob Robinson from one of those "how did I do that" deflections. For Red the successful players were Mal Horrigan, Ron Venables and Rob Andrew. Blue went scoreless until Neil Miller tapped in the equaliser in the last against White to cancel out Ham D'Souza's superb run and strike from an angle. Earlier Paul Robinson had scored in White's 2-1 loss to Red. Goal of the day needs three winners, as Mal Horrigan's and Ham D'Souza's were class goals. Bob Robinson's also is worthy of the award, so it's shared three ways. Some late withdrawals seemed to have reduced the team numbers a little from the unmanageable levels they have been at, but still left the captains a lot of work to do. Numbers were: Red (12), Gold (12), White (11) and Blue (8). Blue's team included Ricky Watts, Julian Gardner and Chip Challenor to make the actual number 11. Total goals (9).

May 29th: Our standard seemed to have dropped, possibly explained by the many missing players:

White: Len Blyth and Ash Foster.

The team least affected by this was probably White, and after they overcame their numbers problem by lending Brian Soares to Red and Robin Bailey and Ken Beer to Blue they played some reasonable hockey in the first two matches, winning both 2-0 before the last two games were draws. Gold also won twice and drew twice. The other two sides (Blue and Red) both failed to score, ending with two losses and two draws. Many opportunities were missed by all teams, but as editorial selfies are not included few names will be mentioned, except for Bob Bowyer who saved a certain goal on the line. Ham D'Souza showed us all how it should be done, scoring well and repeatedly from field play and penalty corners and ending up with four. Phil Metcalf was a threat all day for Gold, & his persistence paid off with two goals, while Ian Purdie used his long reach to advantage for Gold's third. Only two goalkeepers appeared (thank you Colin and Ian) who only lasted five games before calling it a day. Goal of the day was any one of Ham D'Souza's four. Team numbers (based on original allocations) were: White (14), Red (9), Blue (9) and Gold (10). The Blue side had a couple of late arrivals and their nine players included Nevelle Brown (welcome back again) and Ricky Watts, plus the transfers from White already mentioned. Goals scored (8).

June 5th: White captain Dave Horsley had 15 field players at his disposal, and even after shedding three of them to other teams he still had plenty of firepower at his disposal. All matches were close with the exception of the last game of the day, in which White put four past Gold without reply. Results: White (W3, L0, D1), Gold (W1, L1, D2), Blue (W1, L2, D1) and a weakened Red (W0, L2, D2). Many of our good players were not there again (with the exception of the White team), which adversely affected the standard of the hockey. Red did not score, Blue got one only (Peter Dennis), Gold got two (Ken Walter and Peter Willett) & White scorers were Ken Beer (3 from good sea-gulling), Ham DSouza (2) Peter Blockley and Roy Grant (1). Goal of the day went to Peter Blockley after a great set-up by Ham D' Souza. At least there were three goalkeepers present, and the goals were occupied all day. Tony, Barry and Colin all proved difficult to pass, especially if the shot was aimed at their pads, which many were. Our numbers are not as good as they were, excepting for the White team, who are giving away several players each week. For today, the actual counts based on the allocated sides were: Red (8), Blue (9), Gold (11) and White (15). Total goals scored (10) and as can be seen from the scorers list White scored 70% of them.

June 12th: Like the previous week the day was totally dominated by White. They are at nearly full strength (to the extent that I could not get a game for the second consecutive week). For the first time in quite a while there were no draws and the day's results were totally symmetrical - White won four times, Blue and Gold twice each with two losses, and the sadly depleted Red team lost four times. These included a tomahawk by Peter Wallis, a fine deflection by Ham D'Souza, and some great goal-front scavenging by Ken Beer who had enough chances to have scored at least twice as many as he put in. But we had a new name on the 'A' Division score-sheet this week, as David Evans went up to the circle twice during an attacking penalty corner and scored well both times, entitling him to this week's award. Team numbers Blue (7), Gold (8), White (13) and Red (8). Goals scored 16.

June 19th: The weather was good but the hockey was not. Despite the European absentees at the Belgian tournament numbers were adequate, excepting for goalkeepers. Blue were bolstered by Ash Challenor in addition to Chip and Bob Claxton paid us another visit and was immediately recruited for White. The mis-directed, mis-hit passes were almost outnumbered by missed goals, including several absolute sitters, by all teams. A list of the errant forwards will not be included, due to the ban on editorial selfies and lack of space. The two goalkeepers (Barry and Tony) must have been happy with the decision of so many of the forwards that the best path to goal was through the pads, and showed repeatedly that this was not the case. With approximately 10 players away in Antwerp playing hockey at the European Championships and generally having a good time and the annual exodus of players up North to get warm and others in Europe on holiday B Division numbers have been down but the spirit of those left has been admirable. Getting sorted into 2 teams and playing until the body says enough has been the order of the day. Nothing has been diminished in the standard or enjoyment which just goes to show that all you need is a couple of teams, a park and some umpires!!

This month's featured player is Rod Bickers currently playing in the half line for the Blue side. After a lengthy and in depth interview I asked Rod to elucidate his view of the world and the meaning of life from the end of a hockey stick. This is what he told me and how he ended up running around the hockey field at Wednesday Masters.

Clearly not the same pedigree as some of the other elite players that have appeared here before me, but maybe it is not only about that? Some of us are here through perseverance (both personally and by thanks to those around us) and a touch of luck along the way. Most of all I'm here because it is a great game, it's great for our health, and I love the friendships that I have developed over a lifetime through the game.

Until the last couple of years I have played all of my hockey in WA. I started with Redcliffe Rovers in U/13s and eventually made their 1C team. In those days I was not so smart and played Goal Keeper (just kidding, I did enjoy the position at the time and it gave you a great perspective of the game and its strategies). My work then took me to regional WA, and over the next 10 years lived in Harvey, Manjimup and Karratha. In Harvey we played in the Bunbury competition, and I transitioned to the field, and (ha ha) picked up 'most improved' for that first year - I think that was code for how bad I was at the start! Moving to Manjimup was fun, I had my first taste of my favourite position in the midfield, got to play hockey with Jim Balding for the first time, got to play country week for many years, learned to play in ankle deep mud and puddles, and met and married my beautiful wife. Then came Karratha, no rain in the two years we were there, the season opener for both years was played in 42C heat, and you didn't dare fall over or do a sliding tackle because the field was watered from the local sewerage farm and any cut would take many weeks to heal.

Moving back to Perth, I had a bit of time playing in the Northern districts comp, before moving to Mods to start playing in the O/40 masters grades. I discovered the summer comps and then the mid-weeks comps and loved playing a couple of games a week, year round. During this time I started bumping into some of my old friends from Redcliffe Rovers who had moved to Kalamunda, it was only a matter of time before the lure of these friendships saw me moving to Kalamunda (and driving past almost every other club in Perth to get there each week).

Retirement planning led me to seek out Wednesday Masters, I was advised that the teams in C grade were overflowing (maybe more code for how bad I was), and with Simon's permission was promoted to B grade. Hearing how much fun hockey tourism was, I put my name down for the Hobart nationals with WA Country, when they couldn't raise a team I joined ACT (my daughter lives there, and I was thankful for a good reference from Woody). I love how much fun these tournaments are and how great it is bumping into friends wherever you go. Staying in Ballina with the Jimmy Bank's caravan troupe was a highlight. I have loved my time with WHM, the hockey is as good as you can get on a weekly basis, and is so well organised.
