No games are shown for Saturday 26th September, then on the next Saturday (3rd October) all grades except Premier Divisions play a grand final. At the elite level they will play a normal finals round of semi-finals, preliminary final and grand final over the 3 weekends of 3rd, 10th & 17th October. I've Been Everywhere: (Harvey Davies)

1960 to 1961 I started hockey at Manjimup High School in year 11. The school played against Bunbury H.S and in the country high schools hockey week, held on grounds where QE2 hospital is now. I learnt a lot from our teacher coach Trevor Gallagher.

1962 I started doing a BSc (physics major) at UWA. I played hockey for YMCA,

1963 to 1965 I played for the Methodist (soon Uniting Church) Youth Fellowship hockey club with Jim Malcolm and Robin Bailey.

1967 I started in my first job, teaching maths and science at Sogeri High School, which was a boys' boarding school near the start of the Kokoda Trail. We had the same curriculum and textbooks as NSW. I was expected to teach trigonometry, etc. to all these Papua/New Guinea boys. I failed as a teacher of maths and science, but I did have success teaching them to play hockey. I was amazed at how quickly they picked up the skills, rules and tactics. We entered two teams in the Port Morseby Saturday men's competition. After a month, I had to demote myself from the A team to the B team because there were better players than me in the B team!

1968 to 1969 I moved to Hobart to work for the Research Branch of the Education Dept as a statistician and computer programmer. I played hockey for the university.

1970 to 1971 I returned to Perth to work for the Water Board as a scientific programmer. I was a part-time student in the Diploma of Computation (scientific computing) at UWA. I played hockey for Scarborough from 1970 until 1973.

1972 to 1974 The UWA Computing Centre became the WA Regional Computing Centre and I was employed as the training officer. I shared an office with Ros Fisher, who had captained the Australian women's team. I played for Old Modernians in 1974.

1975 to 1977 I moved to Sydney to work for the CSIRO Division of Computing Research. I played Saturday and Inter-varsity hockey for Macquarie University, where I was a part-time student in the *Master of Environmental Studies*.

1978 My wife and three children moved back to Perth. I followed them about six months later and marriage ended after about another six months.

I had about six months without a job. During this period, I wrote my master's thesis titled *Computer Simulation of the Formation of Photochemical Smog*, based on work I had done in Sydney.

I played hockey for Subiaco club from 1979 until about 1981. This club was in a mess. We went to the annual Bunbury Carnival, where most of the team got drunk on the Saturday night and refused to play on the Sunday.

I played for Suburban until 1989. I coached junior Suburban teams containing my two sons. I played for an over-40 team with Brian Pope as captain and Vern Gooch in goals.

From about 1986 until 1989, I organised a mixed hockey team called the *Pink Galahs* (with pink shirts). Ros Fisher played a few games with us and recruited some classy first-division women. John Monkton, who was a state player in his youth, travelled from York. Both my sons played. It was lots of fun.

1979 Temporary work with *CSIRO Division of Land Resources Management* leading to publication of book: *On rational grounds: Systems Analysis in Catchment Land Use Planning.*

1980 Lecturer at WA Institute of Technology Department of Mathematics and Computing.

1981 More temporary work with *CSIRO Division of Land Resources Management*, this time doing computer simulation of waves and erosion along Perth's coast.

1982 to 1983 Computer Systems Officer at State Energy Commission.

1984 to 1987 Research Officer at Department of Marine and Harbours

1988 to 1989 Contract programming.


1990 to 2006 I got a job in the new CSIRO climate change project in Melbourne. I played hockey for three different clubs in Melbourne, but never found a comfortable niche. The only season of hockey I really enjoyed was when I played in a social men's grade where there were about as many women as men.

2007 to 2020 I retired from CSIRO and returned to Perth. I played hockey for Suburban until 2012, when we experienced an 11-0 thrashing by NCR. This humiliation led to formation of the Saturday competition at Perry Lakes in 2013.

In 2014, I played for Southern Cross at The Hague.

In 2007, I started playing for WA Country in the Australian Masters Championships. I managed the team from 2012 until 2019.

In 2016 I played for Wales in the World Cup at Newcastle, NSW. There were only four over-70 teams, Australia, England, Japan and Wales. We won bronze by beating Japan in a shoot-out.

National Championships 2021: May 16, 2020

Hockey Australia CEO Matt Favier and Hockey Australia Masters Co-Chairs Norman Same and Sue Briggs have released the following statement to the State Delegates and Member Associations in regards to the 2021 National Championships and World Cup Dates.

"Dear Member Associations and Masters Delegates, This letter seeks to address concerns following the public announcement last Thursday (30 April) on the Hockey Australia Masters Facebook page of the dates for the 2021 Mega-Masters Championships.

Firstly, the HA Masters Committee (HAMC) apologise that the dates were made public without providing all available information. Ideally, this information would have been communicated when confirming the dates. We appreciate that the revised dates of the Masters World Cup announced by World Masters Hockey (WMH) — specifically the event and age groups scheduled to be held in South Africa — now clashes with the dates of the Mega-Masters event. This clash of dates has sparked much conversation and questions among the HA Masters community that as a Committee, we recognise it is important to address. Please also note that we are still awaiting revised dates for the 2021 Masters World Cups that are due to be held in Tokyo.

With the release of the Masters World Cup dates, HA and HAMC reviewed the landscape and discussed at length the impacts on the 2021 Mega-Masters. In review of the situation and all known factors, it was determined that we would continue to plan for a 2021 Mega-Masters event to be held in September/October.

As you would appreciate, this has been a very fluid and complex matter to navigate which continues to present challenges across the coming phase as we all attempt to implement plans amidst what still remains to be a great deal of uncertainty.


Outlined below, are the key areas that have been considered by the HA Masters Committee in arriving at the current position.

- 1. Players not being available for 2021 Mega-Masters due to Masters World Cups in South Africa
- There is some initial work being done on designing a draw that will facilitate participants (players, team staff and officials) returning from South Africa and directly attending the Mega-Masters (should they choose to).
- Where this is not possible, we understand that some new players may be given the opportunity to represent their States/Territories.
- This may mean there is a reduction in team entries in these age groups in some circumstances.
- 2. Selection for Australian Masters teams from the 2021 Mega-Masters event
- Our existing selection policy allows for consideration to be given where players are not available to attend the National Championships due to national representative duties.
- This will be reviewed and strengthened if required to ensure that no player is adversely affected.
- 3. Why couldn't the dates be pushed back 12 months and the same timings kept?
- There are many factors to this, including contractual agreements with funding partners to deliver this event in 2021, as well as current timelines for the completion of construction works at the Newcastle International Hockey Centre that would not support a July delivery.
- There still remains a high degree of uncertainty concerning international travel into 2021 and while we hope that travel will be possible, it remains unclear as to when this may be possible.

In summary, with typically over 80 men's and 35 women's teams attending our National Championships (totalling over 2,300 participants) there are many factors to consider and no perfect solution. We will continue to do everything we can to support our nationally selected teams (Indoor and Outdoor) and guarantee the future of our National Championships (Outdoor) and Indoor Challenges (Indoor).

We trust this information provides greater context for this decision. As with everything surrounding COVID-19, we will continue to monitor the situation as developments occur. Meanwhile, HA and HAMC look forward to engaging MA's and Delegates in plans to confirm 2022-2027 dates and locations over the coming months for advance planning.
